


Image: JESUS MAFA, Cameroon, Africa, 1973 Healing of the Ten Lepers,

FIRST READING

Jeremiah 29:1,4-7

A reading from the Prophet Jeremiah

Jeremiah encourages the exiles in Babylon to settle into their new country, to build homes and lives there among the Babylonian people and to work for the prosperity of their new land.

These are the words of the letter that the prophet Jeremiah sent from Jerusalem to the remaining elders among the exiles, and to the priests, the prophets, and all the people, whom Nebuchadnezzar had taken into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon. This was after King Jeconiah, and the queen mother, the court officials, the leaders of Judah and Jerusalem, the artisans, and the smiths had departed from Jerusalem. The letter was sent by the hand of Elasah son of Shaphan and Gemariah son of Hilkiah, whom King Zedekiah of Judah sent to Babylon to King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylon. It said: Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat what they produce. Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the Lord on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.

Hear what the Spirit is saying to the Church.



SECOND READING

2 Timothy 2:8-15

A reading from Paul's Second Letter to Timothy

Although Paul is imprisoned for preaching the Gospel of Christ's resurrection, the Gospel itself is not imprisoned. God offers life to those who die with Christ, and God remains always faithful, which is why Paul encourages Timothy to remind people of these signs and to continue to serve and teach faithfully.

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David—that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like

a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure: If we have died with him, we will also live with him; if we endure, we will also reign with him; if we deny him, he will also deny us; if we are faithless, he remains faithful—for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

GOSPEL

Luke 17:11-19

A reading from the holy gospel according to Luke

Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus sends ten men with a skin disease to show themselves to the priests and they are healed as they go, but only one, a Samaritan, returns to give thanks.

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, “Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!” When he saw them, he said to them, “Go and show yourselves to the priests.” And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus’ feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, “Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?” Then he said to him, “Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well.”

Loving God, in Jesus you gather us into your family, and we may confidently call you Abba Father; hear us as we pray for ourselves; may your Spirit bring us to share in the glorious liberty of your children as we seek to live out your command to love you and to love our neighbours as ourselves. *Lord in your mercy, hear our prayer.*

Reflections on the Readings

This week the theme could be called 'The Liberated Gospel'! The thread running through all of the readings is about 'outsiders' being included in God's grace and among God's people – or of God's people making themselves at home among those with whom they would normally not have associated. Jeremiah encourages the exiles to settle in Babylon, and Elisha heals a Gentile soldier. Both Psalms call all the earth and all people to join in the praise of God. Jesus heals a group of men with skin diseases, including a despised Samaritan, and only the 'outsider' Samaritan returns to give thanks. And Paul celebrates the Gospel that is not imprisoned, but, through God's faithfulness is available to all. It's a week to celebrate the indiscriminate, all-encompassing love, grace, and life of God, and to hear the call to live this radical inclusivity in our times and circumstances.

If the Church is to retain any prophetic voice in our current era, it must relearn the radical inclusivity of Christ. Contrary to the 'popular' version of the 'Gospel' that makes Christianity an exclusive enclave for those who have prayed the right prayer, or who agree to the right theological ideas, the faith of those who follow Christ must be one that opens its arms to all others. This means that, as many in the emerging church conversation have suggested, we need to move from a process that goes from believing to behaving to belonging, to the reverse process of offering belonging first (with no strings attached), and then allowing our relationships to influence behaving and ultimately lead to faith – or believing. We need to become indiscriminate about who we serve, love, give to, include, and bless. We must refuse to judge or disassociate from others on the basis of any false distinctions. We can no longer allow a word like 'Muslim' to become an insult, but must rather honour those who follow this faith with sincerity and commitment. We can no longer allow our faith to lead us into arrogance, dominance, exploitation, or dismissal of others. This means that in every community, we cannot avoid making ourselves at home among those whom we would naturally avoid. What this means for your Church will be recognised very quickly when you identify those who are missing from your Sunday gatherings, but whom you can't help but notice as you pass them on the street during the week. *Adapted from John van de Laar (2015)*

The Anglican Parish of Kilmore hope to open two Playgroup Centres in the near future. This idea was first initiated by the parish 'Mums & Bubs' group. Months of discussions and planning have gone into this worthwhile parish and outreach program. We will be under the auspice of the Christian Playgroup Network. We will advise when and where we will have this group.

Christian Playgroup History

For many decades now, the value of playgroups in the local community has been identified and appreciated. Hundreds of Christian playgroups are scattered throughout Australia – some meeting in churches, others in local community buildings. As people talked about wanting to be more intentional in their playgroup as a mission to their local community, a need emerged for some cohesion and networking between these groups. In 2001 a group of people started meeting and praying about how this could happen and develop. After much discussion and prayer, in November 2002, the Christian Playgroup Network was formally launched. We look back with thanksgiving to God for the inspiration and dedication that launched the Christian Playgroup Network and for all the playgroups and churches that have been a part of the network and continue to minister to playgroup families; and we look to the future trusting that God will continue to shape the Christian Playgroup Network for his kingdom purposes.

Introducing our new Parish Women's Group. Gian Bian Yulendj. Over the last couple of months, a small core group of women have been meeting to investigate the possibility of a parish women's group. We plan to meet monthly and can have a time of fellowship and or a time of outreach. Discussions were held of Who, What, How and Why this group would be valuable to our Parish and the Wider Community. We saw this group being Christ Centred and Missional. Offering hospitality, care, support, outreach, time for ourselves and to be of service to the wider community and building relationships. A draft of the the Mission and Vision is a work in progress. We will continue to shape this Mission and Vision over the next few months.

Gian Bian Yulendj, will have at it's core a missional base, that reflects the 5 Marks of Mission. We will pause from our daily lives to spend time drinking in the richness of being in fellowship with each other in a nurturing, supporting and caring environment, by supplying hospitality and service to others and ourselves.

Naming a group was proving difficult. A parish member suggested that perhaps we could use an aboriginal name. As we are in Taungurung Country, we investigated a name that suited our Vision and Mission. A woman, a Taungurung Elder, who is the Language & Project Coordinator at Taungurung Clans is based in Broadford, spoke to us to ascertain what sort of name we were seeking. Gian Bian Yulendj (pronounced giarn biarn yulenj) gained consensus. Our next get together is on 12 November, Gavan Hall 2.00pm.
