⁸ They heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden. ⁹ But the Lord God called to the man, and said to him, 'Where are you?' ¹⁰ He said, 'I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself.' ¹¹ He said, 'Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?' ¹² The man said, 'The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit from the tree, and I ate.' ¹³ Then the Lord God said to the woman, 'What is this that you have done?' SECOND READING

A reading from Paul's Second letter to the Corinthians chapter 4.13 - 5.1

4 ¹³ But just as we have the same spirit of faith that is in accordance with scripture—'I believed, and so I spoke'—we also believe, and so we speak, ¹⁴ because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence. ¹⁵ Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people, may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God. ¹⁶ So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. ¹⁷ For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, ¹⁸ because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal. ⁵ For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens.

²⁰ and the crowd came together again, so that they could not even eat. ²¹ When his family heard it, they went out to restrain him, for people were saying, 'He has gone out of his mind.' ²² And the scribes who came down from Jerusalem said, 'He has Beelzebul, and by the ruler of the demons he casts out demons.' ²³ And he called them to him, and spoke to them in parables, 'How can Satan cast out Satan? ²⁴ If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. ²⁵ And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. ²⁶ And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand, but his end has come. ²⁷ But no one can enter a strong man's house and plunder his property without first tying up

the strong man; then indeed the house can be plundered. ²⁸ 'Truly I tell you, people will be forgiven for their sins and whatever blasphemies they utter; ²⁹ but whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit can never have forgiveness, but is guilty of an eternal sin'— ³⁰ for they had said, 'He has an unclean spirit.' ³¹ Then his mother and his brothers came; and standing outside, they sent to him and called him. ³² A crowd was sitting around him; and they said to him, 'Your mother and your brothers and sisters are outside, asking for you.' ³³ And he replied, 'Who are my mother and my brothers?' ³⁴ And looking at those who sat around him, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers! ³⁵ Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother.'

What is the 'Week of Prayer for Reconciliation'?

The historic 'Mabo judgment' was handed down by the Australian High Court on 3 June 1992. This recognised that Eddie Mabo, on behalf of his people, held 'native title' to the lands in the Torres Strait on which they had lived for generations. In effect, their possession of this land — in part sustained by their Anglican identity — had never been removed. The decision gave all Australians a new 'imagining' of the land, setting aside the notion of it being 'terra nullius' — empty prior to

European settlement. The date fell a week after the anniversary of the Referendum, which took place on 27 May 1967, that removed words from the Constitution that (i) excluded government responsibility for the "the aboriginal people in any State", and (ii) excluded Aboriginal people from being counted in the Census. The Referendum, which passed with over 90 per cent voting in its favour, took effect from 10 August 1967. The change was a small step — not until 1995 could indigenous Australians vote in every state — but marked the beginnings of the process of reconciliation. When the National Council of Churches in Australia formed in 1994, its first Forum set up the Week of Prayer for Reconciliation, to run each year from 27 May to 3 June. The week was included in the Calendar of APBA (1995), along with 'Coming of the Light' on 1 July, which commemorated the arrival of the Gospel to the Torres Strait. But there is a longer history behind these commemorations. Despite many failures and misunderstandings, Australian churches have sought to share the Gospel with the indigenous people of this land from the first arrival of Europeans. In 1910, based on their experience of mission work, the Australian Board of Missions and the Church Missionary Society proposed that each church set aside one Sunday each year to focus on indigenous issues. They proposed the scripture readings set out in the Resources for liturgical use on p. 55. 'Reconciliation' has a wide meaning in the scriptures. It is grounded in the life-giving work of Jesus Christ, whose atoning death was the means of all things being reconciled to God — and calling us to be reconciled to one another (cf Matthew 5:24). As Paul taught, in Christ all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell; through Christ God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross. Colossians 1:19-20

God reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of recon-ciliation to us. So, we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us: we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. *2 Corinthians 5:17-21*

In this land, the mistreatment, misunderstandings and abuse of its indigenous peoples by those who have arrived since 1788 has been called its 'original sin'. It carried over to racist behaviour and attitudes towards 'non-white' immigrants — the 'White Australia' policy, finally dismantled in 1973. Australia's churches long acted toward one another in sectarian ways, rather than seeing each other as fellow citizens of heaven. All these, and other aspects of reconciliation, can be brought to mind in this week, but its particular focus must remain on our 'original sin'.
