THE COLLECT

Most holy God, in whose presence angels serve in awe, and whose glory fills all heaven and earth: cleanse our unclean lips and transform us by your grace so that your word spoken through us may bring many to your salvation; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. **Amen.**

FIRST READING

A reading from the Book of the prophet Isaiah Chapter 6.1 - 8

¹ In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw the Lord sitting on a throne, high and lofty; and the hem of his robe filled the temple. ² Seraphs were in attendance above him; each had six wings: with two they covered their faces, and with two they covered their feet, and with two they flew. ³ And one called to another and said: 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory.' ⁴ The pivots on the thresholds shook at the voices of those who called, and the house filled with smoke. ⁵ And I said: 'Woe is me! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips, and I live among a people of unclean lips; yet my eyes have seen the King, the Lord of hosts!' ⁶ Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding a live coal that had been taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. ⁷ The seraph touched my mouth with it and said: 'Now that this has touched your lips, your guilt has departed and your sin is blotted out.' ⁸ Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: 138

Said: Lord your love is eternal; do not forsake the work of your hands.

¹ I will give you thanks, O Lord, with my whole heart: even before the gods will I sing your praises. ² I will bow down toward your holy temple and give thanks to your name: because of your faithfulness and your loving-kindness, for you have made your name and your word supreme over all things. ³ At a time when I called to you, you gave me answer: and put new strength within my soul. ⁴ All the kings of the earth shall praise you, O Lord: for they have heard the words of your mouth; Lord your love is eternal; do not forsake the work of your hands.

⁵ And they shall sing of the ways of the Lord: that the glory of the Lord is great.

⁶ For though the Lord is exalted, he looks upon the lowly: and he comprehends the proud from afar. ⁷ Though I walk in the midst of danger, yet will you preserve my life: you will stretch out your hand against the fury of my enemies, and your right hand shall save me. ⁸ The Lord will complete his purpose for me: your loving-kindness, O Lord, endures for ever; do not forsake the work of your own hands. **Lord your love is eternal; do not forsake the work of your hands.**

SECOND READING

A reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians Chapter 15.1 - 11

¹ Now I should remind you, brothers and sisters, of the good news that I proclaimed to you, which you in turn received, in which also you stand, ² through which also you are being saved, if you hold firmly to the message that I proclaimed to youunless you have come to believe in vain. ³ For I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures, ⁴ and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the scriptures, ⁵ and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. 6 Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. ⁷ Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. 8 Last of all, as to someone untimely born, he appeared also to me. 9 For I am the least of the apostles, unfit to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. ¹⁰ But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace towards me has not been in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them-though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. ¹¹ Whether then it was I or they, so we proclaim and so you have come to believe.

THE GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

Alleluia, Alleluia! Alleluia, Alleluia!

Come follow me, says the Lord, and I will make you fishers of my people. Alleluia! Alleluia!

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke Chapter 5.1 - 11

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

¹ Once while Jesus was standing beside the lake of Gennesaret, and the crowd was pressing in on him to hear the word of God, ² he saw two boats there at the shore of the lake; the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. ³ He got into one of the boats, the one belonging to Simon, and asked him to put out a little way from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat.⁴ When he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, 'Put out into the deep water and let down your nets for a catch.' ⁵ Simon answered, 'Master, we have worked all night long but have caught nothing. Yet if you say so, I will let down the nets.' ⁶ When they had done this, they caught so many fish that their nets were beginning to break. ⁷ So they signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both boats, so that they began to sink. ⁸ But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, 'Go away from me, Lord, for I am a sinful man!' ⁹ For he and all who were with him were amazed at the catch of fish that they had taken; ¹⁰ and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. Then Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people.' ¹¹ When they had brought their boats to shore, they left everything and followed him.

Most of all we pray in hope for a future blessed by the learnings of the past, strengthened by the sacrifice of so many, safer for the vigilance of those in positions of responsibility, to be gentler and more compassionate in the knowledge of our vulnerability. May we not be defeated by the memories of the past but inspired to build a safer and more caring tomorrow. (pause) We pray for the homeless, and those without support of caring relationships; for those estranged from families and those whose lives are without joy; for ourselves, our families, our neighbours and friends. Your gospel gives us courage to leave behind resentment, bitterness and hurt; give us grace to believe and tell this good news. God, in your mercy, hear our prayer.

We pray for all who suffer, those in need of your spirit of acceptance and healing: for those afraid for the present and without hope for the future; for those for whom each day is a struggle to survive; for those whose lives are filled with loneliness, grief and pain. Almighty God, you have promised to hear our prayers. Grant that what we have asked in faith we may by your grace receive, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
