Sentence

'Heaven and earth will pass away,' says the Lord, 'but my words will not pass away'. (Mark 13:31).

The Collect

Eternal God, through long generations you prepared a way for the coming of your Son, and by your Spirit you still bring light to illumine our paths: renew us in faith and hope that we may welcome Christ to rule our thoughts and claim our love; to whom be glory forever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah, chapter 64, beginning at verse 1. O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence— as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil— to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence! When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him. You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed. We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth. We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away. There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity. Yet, O Lord, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand. Do not be exceedingly angry, O Lord, and do not remember iniquity for ever. Now consider, we are all your people.

Second Reading

A reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians, chapter 1, beginning at verse 1.

Paul, called to be an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, and our brother Sosthenes, To the church of God that is in Corinth, to those who are sanctified in Christ Jesus, called to be saints, together with all those who in every place call on the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, both their Lord and ours: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that has been given you in Christ Jesus, for in every way you have been enriched in him, in speech and knowledge of every kind— just as the testimony of Christ has been strengthened among you— so that you are not lacking in any spiritual gift as you wait for the revealing of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will also strengthen you to the end, so that you may be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God is faithful; by him you were called into the fellowship of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in clouds" with great power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of heaven. 'From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away. 'But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Thoughts for the Week

One of the biggest pushbacks against the Church is the cry of: 'don't indoctrinate me'. We all love our freewill, don't we? And yet, whether wittingly or unwittingly, we actually tend to find ourselves corralled into some form of social or cultural conditioning. In a word: indoctrinated. We don't like to admit that every opinion we form, every shred of belief or value we have in life is affected, conditioned or even pushed by a view that is not our own. So technically, we tend to be fighting a losing battle on the freewill front. We can certainly make up our minds, but we have to pick a side. No man (or woman) is an island, as they say. The point is, it's unfair to say that the Church indoctrinates, or brainwashes, or pushes harmful ideologies, without also acknowledging that secular or humanist ideologies have just as much potential to be harmful. The Church, in practice, may not be the pinnacle of moral fortitude it posits itself to be, but it doesn't make the Church the villain of the piece. It certainly doesn't make God the villain, or the belief in him a path down the wrong rabbit hole. We are all entitled to a viewpoint, but we should bear in mind that when we start using words like indoctrinate, hate speech, or dogma, we are actually creating a creed of our own, as much as we want to stamp out even the term creed, as it pertains to the religion we may be fighting against. In other words, you can't say the Church is intolerant without exercising a degree of intolerance. Even to say the Church is preachy demonstrates, even indirectly, an aspect of your lifestyle that is worth preaching against. The gospel message does not exist in a vacuum; it is disseminated in contrary motion to a force working against it. If the Church denounces this thing it calls sin, well, it's because sin exists, and it is detrimental to individuals and society alike. Jesus didn't teach because he liked the sound of his own voice. He wanted to prevent people from erring too far in a detrimental direction. The Church carries on this practice of teaching because it fears people being indoctrinated by humanity. The same humanity that promises life without consequences, like snake oil salesmen peddling placebos. The Church, at least in theory, is neither opiate nor toxin; it is an antibiotic. The gospel, the creed, all that, is preventative medicine for the lethargy, ignorance and vice that all-too-commonly plague our minds.
