Sentence

The Collect

Eternal God, neither death nor life can separate us from your love: grant that we may serve you faithfully here on earth, and in heaven rejoice with all your saints who ceaselessly proclaim your glory; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of Revelation, chapter 7, beginning at verse 9. After this I looked, and there was a great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, robed in white, with palm branches in their hands. They cried out in a loud voice, saying, 'Salvation belongs to our God who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!' And all the angels stood around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshipped God, singing, 'Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honour and power and might be to our God for ever and ever! Amen.' Then one of the elders addressed me, saying, 'Who are these, robed in white, and where have they come from?' I said to him, 'Sir, you are the one that knows.' Then he said to me, 'These are they who have come out of the great ordeal; they have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. For this reason they are before the throne of God, and worship him day and night within his temple, and the one who is seated on the throne will shelter them. They will hunger no more, and thirst no more; the sun will not strike them, nor any scorching heat; for the Lamb at the centre of the throne will be their shepherd, and he will guide them to springs of the water of life, and God will wipe away every tear from their eyes.'

Second Reading

A reading from the First Letter of John, chapter 3, beginning at verse 1.

See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God; and that is what we are. The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know him. Beloved, we are God's children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed. What we do know is this: when he is revealed, we will be like him, for we will see him as he is. And all who have this hope in him purify themselves, just as he is pure.

Everyone who commits sin is guilty of lawlessness; sin is lawlessness. You know that he was revealed to take away sins, and in him there is no sin. No one who abides in him sins; no one who sins has either seen him or known him. Little children, let no one deceive you. Everyone who does what is right is righteous, just as he is righteous. Everyone who commits sin is a child of the devil; for the devil has been sinning from the beginning. The Son of God was revealed for this purpose, to destroy the works of the devil. Those who have been born of God do not sin, because God's seed abides in them; they cannot sin, because they have been born of God. The children of God and the children of the devil are revealed in this way: all who do not do what is right are not from God, nor are those who do not love their brothers and sisters.

Thoughts for the Week

With this week being home to Halloween, All Saints and All Souls, I've done a fair bit of reflecting on, shall we say, end-of-life ministry. And it occurred to me that several problems with the Church today is that we make Death the most interesting person in the room. It is a figure we all must face, but as a species, we are obsessed with it. And not simply those in their twilight years. Death is a selling point for stories across a range of media. Murder is a key plot device because it straddles the line of reality (death comes to us all) and unreality (it'll never happen to me). Death has become a lucrative enterprise, with an ever-increasing range of options for 'saying goodbye'. Thousands of years of burial rituals later, and we still can't get it right. Because we can't stop death. We can delay

the inevitable with everything from heart valves to anti-ageing cream. But we can't defeat it. We can't take the pain out of losing a loved one. Or can we? As much as the world rolls its eyes at organised religion, it cannot be disputed that Christianity can actually offer viable ways of dealing with Death. In one sense, it shifts one's focus from the human being as the pinnacle of existence, to the community as the pinnacle of existence. When an individual dies, according to Christian thought, their body might end, but not their life. What we are living now is a transitional state to something far greater. The aim of belief in something greater is for those who are 'alive' at any given point to work together to create a foretaste of that something greater. When Jesus' death took away 'the sting of death', this means his death stands to change our perspective on the importance of the human person. We are each but one link in a much longer chain. Each link is irreplaceable, but when one is lost, our focus must not be the link itself, but the chain. What Jesus gives us is an image of that chain, rather the scattered links, as an ideal to which we must aspire. One life is most important when it feeds, fuels and inspires the lives of many, such that Death does not become a full stop, but merely a comma in the sentence of life.
