

Third Sunday After Epiphany



Sentence

The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God is at hand; repent, and believe in the gospel. (Mark 1:15)

The Collect

Bountiful God, through your Son you have called us to repent of our sin, to believe the good news, and to celebrate the coming of your kingdom: teach us, like Christ's first apostles, to hear the call to discipleship, and, forsaking old ways, to proclaim the gospel of new life to a broken world; through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of Jonah, chapter 3, beginning at verse 1.

Then the word of the Lord came to Jonah a second time: 'Go to the great city of Nineveh and proclaim to it the message I give you.' Jonah obeyed the word of the Lord and went to Nineveh. Now Nineveh was a very large city; it took three days to go through it. Jonah began by going a day's journey into the city, proclaiming, 'Forty more days and Nineveh will be overthrown.' The Ninevites believed God. A fast was proclaimed, and all of them, from the greatest to the least, put on sackcloth. When Jonah's warning reached the king of Nineveh, he rose from his throne, took off his royal robes, covered himself with sackcloth and sat down in the dust. This is the proclamation he issued in Nineveh: 'By the decree of the king and his nobles: Do not let people or animals, herds or flocks, taste anything; do not let them eat or drink. But let people and animals be covered with sackcloth. Let everyone call urgently on God. Let them give up their evil ways and their violence. Who knows? God may yet relent and with compassion turn from his fierce anger so that we will not perish.' When God saw what they did and how they turned from their evil ways, he relented and did not bring on them the destruction he had threatened.

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 62, verses 5 to 12 (said by alternate verses)

Nevertheless, my soul, wait in silence for God: for from him comes my hope.

He only is my rock and my salvation: my strong tower, so that I shall not be moved.

In God is my deliverance and my glory: God is my strong rock and my shelter.

Trust in him at all times, O my people: pour out your hearts before him, for God is our refuge.

The children of Adam are but breath, the children of earth are a lie: place them in the scales and they fly upward, they are as light as air.

Put no trust in extortion, do not grow worthless by robbery: if riches increase, set not your heart upon them.

God has spoken once, twice have I heard him say: that power belongs to God,

That to the Lord belongs a constant goodness: for you reward each one of us according to our works.

Second Reading

A reading from Paul's first Letter to the Corinthians, chapter 7, beginning at verse 29.

What I mean, brothers and sisters, is that the time is short. From now on those who have wives should live as if they do not; those who mourn, as if they did not; those who are happy, as if they were not; those who buy something, as if it were not theirs to keep; those who use the things of the world, as if not engrossed in them. For this world in its present form is passing away.

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia! Alleluia!

Whoever would be my disciple, let him take up his cross and follow me.

Alleluia!

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

After John was put in prison, Jesus went into Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God. 'The time has come,' he said. 'The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!' As Jesus walked beside the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the lake, for they were fishermen. 'Come, follow me,' Jesus said, 'and I will send you out to fish for people.' At once they left their nets and followed him. When he had gone a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John in a boat, preparing their nets. Without delay he called them, and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men and followed him.

We give thanks that you are the God who brings mercy and wholeness. Comfort and heal, we pray, all who are in sorrow, need, sickness, or any other trouble. Give to those who care for them wisdom, patience and gentleness and, to us all, your peace.
