Sentence

Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. (Matthew 9:35)

The Collect

O Lord, you have taught us that all our doings without love are worth nothing: send your Holy Spirit, and pour into our hearts that most excellent gift of love, the true bond of peace and of all virtues, without which whoever lives is counted dead before you; Grant this for the sake of your only, Son Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy, chapter 18, beginning at verse 15. The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among you, from your fellow Israelites. You must listen to him. For this is what you asked of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said, 'Let us not hear the voice of the Lord our God nor see this great fire any more, or we will die.' The Lord said to me: 'What they say is good. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their fellow Israelites, and I will put my words in his mouth. He will tell them everything I command him. I myself will call to account anyone who does not listen to my words that the prophet speaks in my name. But a prophet who presumes to speak in my name anything I have not commanded, or a prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, is to be put to death.'

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 111

R: I will praise the Lord with my whole heart, in the company of the upright.

Great are the works of the Lord, studied by all who delight in them. Full of honour and majesty is his work, and his righteousness endures for ever. **R...**

He has gained renown by his wonderful deeds; the Lord is gracious and merciful. He provides food for those who fear him; he is ever mindful of his covenant. He has shown his people the power of his works, in giving them the heritage of the nations. **R...**

Second Reading

A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Corinthians, chapter 8, beginning at verse 1.

Now about food sacrificed to idols: we know that 'We all possess knowledge.' But knowledge puffs up while love builds up. Those who think they know something do not yet know as they ought to know. But whoever loves God is known by God. So then, about eating food sacrificed to idols: we know that 'An idol is nothing at all in the world' and that 'There is no God but one.' For even if there are so-called gods, whether in heaven or on earth (as indeed there are many 'gods' and many 'lords'), yet for us there is but one God, the Father, from whom all things came and for whom we live; and there is but one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom all things came and through whom we live. But not everyone possesses this knowledge. Some people are still so accustomed to idols that when they eat sacrificial food they think of it as having been sacrificed to a god, and since their conscience is weak, it is defiled. But food does not bring us near to God; we are no worse if we do not eat, and no better if we do. Be careful, however, that the exercise of your rights does not become a stumbling-block to the weak.

For if someone with a weak conscience sees you, with all your knowledge, eating in an idol's temple, won't that person be emboldened to eat what is sacrificed to idols? So this weak brother or sister, for whom Christ died, is destroyed by your knowledge. When you sin against them in this way and wound their weak conscience, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if what I eat causes my brother or sister to fall into sin, I will never eat meat again, so that I will not cause them to fall.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark, chapter 1, beginning at the fourth verse.

Thoughts for the Week

If they don't know, they won't go. More than once has it come up in conversation, that I've offered baptism, confirmation, bible study. pastoral care or the like to children via their parents. The response is almost invariably: 'we'll let them decide when they're old enough.' The phrase that runs through my head afterwards is: if they don't know, they won't go. God the Father exists regardless of human beings, as does Jesus, as does the Holy Spirit. Christian discipleship, however, is a not only a gift of the Lord, but a human practice of self-healing, relationship building, and moral and social edification. And because it is a human practice, given for our sake, we need to, well...practice it. For the sake of their children, it behoves the parents to model Christian discipleship and education. See, the thing with every other contemporary or new age spirituality, is that they are EVERYWHERE. And they are seemingly easy, because practice equates to materialism. The sheer amount of STUFF you have to buy to consider yourself 'spiritual but not religious' these days. The irony is, of course, people try to set themselves free by dangling more and more stuff from every limb of their body and every rafter of their house. The presence of material effects is meant to answer for spiritual practice; though admittedly it does seem like a sort of 'fire and forget' approach. The other aspect, of course, is that some people absolutely love routines, such that they busy themselves with everything from gym sessions to paint-by-numbers. Little realising, of course, that the practice of Christianity is so routine-driven. Look at the prayer book, it's all there for you to pray two to three times a day, plus going to Mass. If you ask me, the 'spiritual but not religious' mob are running out of valid excuses for not exercising their Christian dignity. It boils down to laziness, ignorance, and a refusal to educate oneself in the true practices of the Church, not just skimming the headlines in secular media. At the core of Christian discipleship is routine, as well as education, vocational and moral discernment, social justice, and the

formation of permanent spiritual resources beyond oneself for the purposes of self-healing and growth. These are vital elements for the developing young mind, as well as any other for that matter. But: if they don't know they won't go, and if they don't go, they won't know. It's up to you to bring them along.
