Fifth Sunday in Lent



<u>Sentence</u>

'This is the covenant I will make with them,' says the Lord God: 'I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God and they shall be my people.' (*Jeremiah 31:33*)

The Collect

O God, our Redeemer, in our weakness we have failed to be your messengers of forgiveness and hope: renew us by your Holy Spirit, that we may follow your commands and proclaim your reign of love; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen**.

First Reading

A reading from the book of Jeremiah, chapter 31, beginning at verse 31.

'The days are coming,' declares the Lord, 'when I will make a new covenant with the people of Israel and with the people of Judah. It will not be like the covenant I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to lead them out of Egypt, because they broke my covenant, though I was a husband to them,' declares the Lord. 'This is the covenant that I will make with the people of Israel after that time,' declares the Lord. 'I will put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God, and they will be my people. No longer will they teach their neighbour, or say to one another, "Know the Lord," because they will all know me, from the least of them to the greatest,' declares the Lord. 'For I will forgive their wickedness and will remember their sins no more.'

Second Reading

A reading from the Letter to the Hebrews, chapter 5, beginning at verse 5.

In the same way, Christ did not take on himself the glory of becoming a high priest. But God said to him, 'You are my Son; today I have become your Father.' And he says in another place, 'You are a priest for ever, in the order of Melchizedek.' During the days of Jesus' life on earth, he offered up prayers and petitions with fervent cries and tears to the one who could save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Son though he was, he learned obedience from what he suffered and, once made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him and was designated by God to be high priest in the order of Melchizedek. We have much to say about this, but it is hard to make it clear to you because you no longer try to understand. In fact, though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you the elementary truths of God's word all over again. You need milk, not solid food! Anyone who lives on milk, being still an infant, is not acquainted with the teaching about righteousness. But solid food is for the mature, who by constant use have trained themselves to distinguish good from evil.

Now there were some Greeks among those who went up to worship at the festival. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, with a request. 'Sir,' they said, 'we would like to see Jesus.' Philip went to tell Andrew; Andrew and Philip in turn told Jesus. Jesus replied, 'The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed. But if it dies, it produces many seeds. Anyone who loves their life will lose it, while anyone who hates their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me; and where I am, my servant also will be. My Father will honour the one who serves me. 'Now my soul is troubled, and what shall I say? "Father, save me from this hour"? No, it was for this very reason I came to this hour. Father, glorify your name!' Then a voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and will glorify it again.' The crowd that was there and heard it said it had thundered; others said an angel had spoken to him. Jesus said, 'This voice was for your benefit, not mine. Now is the time for judgment on this world; now the prince of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself.' He said this to show the kind of death he was going to die.

Thoughts for the Week

Your job is to be available. It's one of the more profound things a mentor has ever told me. We have an obsession with being busy, and yet nothing ever really gets done. We think we need to take on too much to keep up with the Joneses. We feel the need to tread water furiously to keep our head above the tide, not realising that by various means, for various reasons, our neighbour secretly wields an outboard motor. Your business is your business. Your ability is your ability. There is no such

thing, really, as 'typical'. You are you. And you need the time and the space to be so. You must be available to be authentically you. Not putting on the armour of agenda, for it will either exhaust you from overuse, or rust from eventual and unwitting neglect. Keep the floor of your mind tidy, for many people will come in and dump their stuff all over it, and you'll end up with no space to walk without tripping over something. And it is not a chore to tidy the mind's floor, but an exercise of liberation. If you can't see your mind's floor, you won't have anywhere to sit and just be. Practice availability above all else. Practice having as much space on your mind's floor as you can, before going about your week and accumulating the inevitable mental clutter. Sometimes even nothing can be something; an empty imagination is an absence of passion. It is like having no bookcases or shelves in which to place or file things. Ironic, really, that the practice of having nothing fills us with superfluous stuff anyway. Don't always just remove, but organise; prioritise. Add the shelves and bookcases that help in the process; that is, discern the spiritual practices that are most helpful to you. Someone will read, someone will paint, someone will jog, someone will violin. Whatever makes you available. Whatever makes you, not anxious, but thankful to have someone sit on your mind's floor with you.
