Presentation of Christ in the Temple





Sentence

My eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples; a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel. (Luke 2:30-32)

The Collect

Almighty and ever-living God, we humbly pray that, as your only Son was presented in the temple in accordance with the law, so we may be dedicated to you with pure and clean hearts; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of the prophet Malachi, chapter 3, beginning at verse 1.

See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the Lord whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the Lord of hosts. But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears? For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the Lord in righteousness. Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the Lord as in the days of old and as in former years.

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 84

R: My soul longs to dwell in the courts of the Lord.

How lovely is your dwelling place, O Lord of hosts! My soul longs, indeed it faints for the courts of the Lord; my heart and my flesh sing for joy to the living God. R...

Second Reading

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews, chapter 2, beginning at verse 14.

Since, therefore, the children share flesh and blood, he himself likewise shared the same things, so that through death he might destroy the one who has the power of death, that is, the devil, and free those who all their lives were held in slavery by the fear of death. For it is clear that he did not come to help angels, but the descendants of Abraham. Therefore he had to become like his brothers and sisters in every respect, so that he might be a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make a sacrifice of atonement for the sins of the people. Because he himself was tested by what he suffered, he is able to help those who are being tested.

The Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia! Alleluia!

This child is destined for the rise and fall of many; and to bring to light the innermost thoughts of man.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke, chapter 2, beginning at the twenty-second verse.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

When the time came for their purification according to the law of Moses, they brought him up to Jerusalem to present him to the Lord (as it is written in the law of the Lord, 'Every firstborn male shall be designated as holy to the Lord'), and they offered a sacrifice according to what is stated in the law of the Lord, 'a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons.' Now there was a man in Jerusalem whose name was Simeon; this man was righteous and devout, looking forward to the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit rested on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Guided by the Spirit, Simeon came into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus, to do for him what was customary under the law, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying, 'Master, now you are dismissing your servant in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles and for glory to your people Israel.' And the child's father and mother were amazed at what was being said about him. Then Simeon blessed them and said to his mother Mary, 'This child is destined for the falling and the rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be revealed—and a sword will pierce your own soul too.' There was also a prophet, Anna the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was of a great age, having lived with her husband for seven years after her marriage, then as a widow to the age of eighty-four. She never left the temple but worshipped there with fasting and prayer night and day. At that moment she came and began to praise God and to speak about the child to all who were looking for the redemption of Jerusalem. When they had finished everything required by the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favour of God was upon him.

Thoughts for the Week

In my high school days. I would have sat through around a hundred worship services, many of which were held in the school chapel. Great big wonderful English-style building. Of those many services held in that chapel, I vividly remember relatively few. The services I remember fondly, however, were those outside the chapel building. I remember the ones at night, held in a house, a dormitory, or some other church. There was always something of the sacred or numinous in worshipping with the lights off, Bible pages illuminated only by candlelight. There was something very intimate and meaningful in sharing the Eucharist around a little table, with a handful of students plus the celebrant. The words were the same, albeit not bolstered to the volume of grandeur by a microphone or acoustics. These little services felt special because they felt secret, even furtive. Not because we were necessarily scared, nor doing anything illegal; but because these services were celebrated in the fashion of Jesus' lifetime. There's where the furtive element comes in. When Jesus spoke those immortal words 'this is my body, this is my blood', he was about two hours from being taken into Roman custody. And yet he used that time to institute the Eucharist, or the Mass, so that his disciples had something to remember him by. Nav. something his disciples had to pass on so that future generations could remember him. My point is that sometimes, in order to feel a greater sense of the sacred in worship; sometimes we have to think smaller. Think simpler. Think darker. It makes sense that small, dark, intimate worship in places other than the proverbial 'temple' can be more authentically spiritual, because they are intrinsically acetic. That is, they put aside everything we don't need, emptying our beings (rather than our minds, as sadly some worship tends to do) so that we can look towards what we have to gain. It pays to scale things down, meeting in living rooms, back rooms, or really just any space smaller than a typical church nave. It's not only intimate, acetic, focused, but as I said before, memorable. Did not our Saviour suggest that the purpose of the bread and the cup were to REMEMBER him? How can we make worship take on the status of a CORE MEMORY, rather than a fleeting experience?
