<u>Sentence</u>

The words you have spoken are spirit and life, O Lord; you have the words of eternal life. (John 6:63,68)

The Collect

Bountiful God, we thank you for planting in us the seed of your word: by your Holy Spirit, help us to receive it with joy, and live according to it, that we may grow in faith and hope and love; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of Genesis, chapter 25, beginning at verse 19. These are the descendants of Isaac, Abraham's son: Abraham was the father of Isaac, and Isaac was forty years old when he married Rebekah, daughter of Bethuel the Aramean of Paddan-aram, sister of Laban the Aramean. Isaac prayed to the Lord for his wife, because she was barren; and the Lord granted his prayer, and his wife Rebekah conceived. The children struggled together within her; and she said, 'If it is to be this way, why do I live?' So she went to inquire of the Lord. And the Lord said to her, 'Two nations are in your womb, and two peoples born of you shall be divided; one shall be stronger than the other, the elder shall serve the younger.' When her time to give birth was at hand, there were twins in her womb. The first came out red, all his body like a hairy mantle; so they named him Esau. Afterwards his brother came out, with his hand gripping Esau's heel; so he was named Jacob. Isaac was sixty years old when she bore them. When the boys grew up, Esau was a skilful hunter, a man of the field, while Jacob was a guiet man, living in tents. Isaac loved Esau, because he was fond of game; but Rebekah loved Jacob. Once when Jacob was cooking a stew, Esau came in from the field, and he was famished. Esau said to Jacob, 'Let me eat some of that red stuff, for I am

famished!' (Therefore he was called Edom.) Jacob said, 'First sell me your birthright.' Esau said, 'I am about to die; of what use is a birthright to me?' Jacob said, 'Swear to me first.' So he swore to him, and sold his birthright to Jacob. Then Jacob gave Esau bread and lentil stew, and he ate and drank, and rose and went his way. Thus Esau despised his birthright. Hear the word of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 119, verses 105 to 112 R: Your words are spirit and life, O Lord.

Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.

I have sworn an oath and confirmed it, to observe your righteous ordinances. I am severely afflicted; give me life, O Lord, according to your word. Accept my offerings of praise, O Lord, and teach me your ordinances. R...

Second Reading

A reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans, chapter 8, beginning at verse 1. There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. For the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law-indeed it cannot, and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you. Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia! Alleluia!

The one who sows on fertile ground will know and understand the word of God.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew, chapter 13, beginning at the 1st verse.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

That same day Jesus went out of the house and sat beside the lake. Such great crowds gathered around him that he got into a boat and sat there, while the whole crowd stood on the beach. And he told them many things in parables, saying: 'Listen! A sower went out to sow. And as he sowed, some seeds fell on the path, and the birds came and ate them up. Other seeds fell on rocky ground, where they did not have much soil, and they sprang up quickly, since they had no depth of soil. But when the sun rose, they were scorched; and since they had no root, they withered away. Other seeds fell among thorns, and the thorns grew up and choked them. Other seeds fell on good soil and brought forth grain, some a hundredfold, some sixty, some thirty. 'Let anyone with ears listen! Hear then the parable of the sower. When anyone hears the word of the kingdom and does not understand it, the evil one comes and snatches away what is sown in the heart; this is what was sown on the path. As for what was sown on rocky ground, this is the one who hears the word and immediately receives it with joy; yet such a person has no root, but endures only for a while, and when trouble or persecution arises on account of the word, that person immediately falls away. As for what was sown among thorns, this is the one who hears the word, but the cares of the world and the lure of wealth choke the word, and it yields nothing. But as for what was sown on good soil, this is the one who hears the word and understands it, who indeed bears fruit and yields, in one case a hundredfold, in another sixty, and in another thirty.'

Thoughts for the Week

I recently saw a discussion on social media about how we should address God: do we need to scrub out 'Father' in the 'Our Father'? Would it be better to talk about a Mother God? It got me thinking. I'm well aware of the growing distaste for any patriarchal aspects of organised religion. I'm also well aware that fathers and male authority figures can be confronting, triggering, or just plain conjuring the wrong image of God for people, based on our individual experience of masculinity. The short answer I've landed on for now is this: Father God is not the image we want, but it's the image we need. Motherly love is more unquestionably fierce, unconditional and all-encompassing. I dare say, even in this post-everything society, feminine love tends to be something we take as read. God is arguably best as a Father, not because masculine love is any stronger or better than feminine love, but because it is capricious, elusive and in some cases, downright untrustworthy. By and large, fathers are seldom 'there', whether physically or emotionally. Biologically, men are not as emotionally mature as women, in some cases just an 'id' on legs, and they have a harder time growing into parental responsibilities. A father's love is more akin to God's love, because we don't always feel its presence, or we don't always know its true nature, whether there are strings attached. We don't know how emotionally mature the divine intellect is that created us. God is Father because God is mysterious, and more of a puzzle to determine the nature of his love. Read from the Old Testament to the New, God himself is on a journey to figure out how to love us effectively, so that we will go on a similar journey to learn to love him in return.
