

11th February 2024 Sixth Sunday After Epiphany



Sentence

A great prophet has arisen among us! God has visited his people! (Luke 7:16)

The Collect

Ever-living God, your Son, Jesus Christ, healed the lepers and brought good news to the despised and outcast: grant us your gifts of compassion and self-control, that in serving others in their need we may strive for the imperishable wreath that you bestow on all who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the Second Book of Kings, chapter 5, beginning at verse 1. Now Naaman was commander of the army of the king of Aram. He was a great man in the sight of his master and highly regarded, because through him the Lord had given victory to Aram. He was a valiant soldier, but he had leprosy. Now bands of raiders from Aram had gone out and had taken captive a young girl from Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, 'If only my master would see the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy.' Naaman went to his master and told him what the girl from Israel had said. 'By all means, go,' the king of Aram replied. 'I will send a letter to the king of Israel.' So Naaman left, taking with him ten talents of silver, six thousand shekels of gold and ten sets of clothing. The letter that he took to the king of Israel read: 'With this letter I am sending my servant Naaman to you so that you may cure him of his leprosy.' As soon as the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his robes and said, 'Am I God? Can I kill and bring back to life? Why does this fellow send someone to me to be cured of his leprosy? See how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me!' When Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his robes, he sent him this message: 'Why have you torn your robes? Make the man come to me and he will know that there is a prophet in Israel.' So Naaman went with his horses and chariots and stopped at the door of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to say to him, 'Go, wash yourself seven times in the Jordan, and your flesh will be restored and you will be cleansed.'

But Naaman went away angry and said, 'I thought that he would surely come out to me and stand and call on the name of the Lord his God, wave his hand over the spot and cure me of my leprosy. Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Couldn't I wash in them and be cleansed?' So he turned and went off in a rage. Naaman's servants went to him and said, 'My father, if the prophet had told you to do some great thing, would you not have done it? How much more, then, when he tells you, "Wash and be cleansed"!' So he went down and dipped himself in the Jordan seven times, as the man of God had told him, and his flesh was restored and became clean like that of a young boy.

Second Reading

A reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians, chapter 9, beginning at verse 24.

Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last for ever. Therefore I do not run like someone running aimlessly; I do not fight like a boxer beating the air. No, I strike a blow to my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize.

The Gospel Acclamation

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark, chapter 1, beginning at the fortieth verse.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

A man with leprosy came to him and begged him on his knees, 'If you are willing, you can make me clean.' Jesus was indignant. He reached out his hand and touched the man. 'I am willing,' he said. 'Be clean!' Immediately the leprosy left him and he was cleansed. Jesus sent him away at once with a strong warning: 'See that you don't tell this to anyone. But go, show yourself to the priest and offer the sacrifices that Moses commanded for your cleansing, as a testimony to them.' Instead he went out and began to talk freely, spreading the news. As a result, Jesus could no longer enter a town openly but stayed outside in lonely places. Yet the people still came to him from everywhere.

Thoughts for the Week

It never hurts to ask for help. Churches these day are dwindling in strength and in number, and to put it bluntly, Christians are fighting each other over the scraps off the table. It's impossible to agree on everything; friendships, relationships, marriages, leadership meetings teach us that. But it is possible to compromise and empathise. It is also entirely possible that we are worshipping the same Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. I've been asked in the past whether I am 'Catholic or Christian', to which I've responded one can either be both, or neither. We are entitled to our own theologies; God has as many sides to him as there are people on this earth. But in terms of mobilising the Word of God, as is the mission of the Church universal, we will never get anywhere if we don't learn to swallow our pride and ask for help. When we are able to ask for help from fellow Christians, it will actually grow our courage sufficiently to interact with the wider world. Plenty of groups or even denominations think that there's a marble-sided, gold-plated room for them in Heaven and no one else. Number one, we've got this life to worry about before we even get to that. Number two, no one's got a special room in Heaven; God loves everyone equally. And number three, everything that we and our ancestors believed, toiled and fought for, will be for nought if we don't do something about our attitude. When able volunteers are running dry: ask for help. Because otherwise the people 'out there' beyond the Church asking for help; they will soon run out of Christians to turn to.
