Sentence

Second Reading

A reading from Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians, chapter 5, beginning at verse 14.

For the love of Christ urges us on, because we are convinced that one has died for all; therefore all have died. And he died for all, so that those who live might live no longer for themselves, but for him who died and was raised for them. From now on, therefore, we regard no one from a human point of view; even though we once knew Christ from a human point of view, we know him no longer in that way. So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new! All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ, and has given us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting the message of reconciliation to us. So we are ambassadors for Christ, since God is making his appeal through us; we entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. Hear the word of the Lord.

The Gospel Acclamation

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John, chapter 20, beginning at the 1st verse.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping?' She said to them, 'They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.' When she had said this, she turned round and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, 'Woman, why are you weeping? For whom are you looking?' Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, 'Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away.' Jesus said to her, 'Mary!' She turned and said to him in Hebrew, 'Rabbouni!' (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, 'Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, "I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God."' Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, 'I have seen the Lord'; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

Thoughts for the Week

I know how hard it is to stick to a routine. Conversely, it is very easy to slip into procrastination or a chaotic state of mind. Nevertheless, it is a universal truth that our bodies, our minds, our souls; our very being craves structure. As more of the world is represented on a screen than in real, material life, the harder it is to concentrate, memorise and retain information, and indeed, to have an imagination. The best way to fertilise and strengthen our imagination, at any age mind you, not just in childhood, is to enforce structure in our living. Rules and boundaries for our bodies and minds give our spirit something to rebel against. New ideas come from boundaries that dare us to cross them. But we must first cultivate those boundaries. Every game has rules, that's what makes them fun, because when you operate within given parameters, it gets you thinking laterally about how best to overcome obstacles, meet objectives and generally succeed. Dare I say, the wheels have fallen off society because we have forgotten the importance of living within Godgiven boundaries. We might balk at religion, no one can tell me what to do, there is no God, etc, etc. (change the record already). BUT religious belief gives structure to our inner life, our spiritual life. This in turn gives boundaries to our living. And when we have boundaries to our living, it focuses our attention on the things that matter, and increases our ability to imagine how we can rise to meet the challenges presently around us. Beyond ourselves, that is; we are challenged to think how we can make the game called life fairer on others. If we nurture our minds on social media, as we increasingly do, we will lose fertility of imagination, we will lose the efficacy of storing and processing information, we will lose our ability to think critically and laterally, and as such, we won't be able to think past ourselves. The first boundary, the first edifice of structure we can give our lives is to limit our 'screen time', and spend that time in prayer, in contemplation, or just in silence, and see where our imagination leads us. It will undoubtedly lead you to where God needs you to be, mentally, if not with your whole being. Face it: if you can find the structure to get yourself or the kids up at 7am for sport on the weekend, you can find the structure in your life to pray.
