Sentence

The Collect

Eternal God, our glorious King, whose Son Jesus Christ was transfigured on the holy mountain and seen in splendour by his chosen witnesses: grant us, his followers, faith to perceive his glory, to listen to him, and to walk in his way, that we may be changed into his likeness from glory to glory; for he lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of the prophet Daniel, chapter 7, beginning at verse 9. As I watched: thrones were set up and the Ancient One took his throne. His clothing was bright as snow, and the hair on his head as white as wool; his throne was flames of fire, with wheels of burning fire. A surging stream of fire flowed out from where he sat; Thousands upon thousands were ministering to him, and myriads upon myriads attended him. The court was convened and the books were opened. As the visions during the night continued, I saw: one like a Son of Man coming, on the clouds of heaven; When he reached the Ancient One and was presented before him, The one like a Son of Man received dominion, glory, and kingship; all peoples, nations, and languages serve him. His dominion is an everlasting dominion that shall not be taken away, his kingship shall not be destroyed. Hear the word of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm

Second Reading

A reading from the Second Letter of Peter, chapter 1, beginning at verse 16. For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honour and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, 'This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased.' We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while we were with him on the holy mountain. So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God. Hear the word of the Lord.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark, chapter 9, beginning at the 2nd verse.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

Six days later, Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, 'Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah.' He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud overshadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, 'This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!' Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead. So they kept the matter to themselves, questioning what this rising from the dead could mean.

Thoughts for the Week

You've probably heard the phrase 'doing things by the book'. Naturally, one would assume that as Christians, we would indeed live 'by the book', said book being the Bible. There are a few issues with this particular idiom. First of all, there are a great many nominal Christians who haven't studied the scriptures in any great detail since Sunday school. Now, Sunday schools have never been perfect, and to the precocious or even rebellious pre-teen, moral teaching presents something to discredit or combat. It's usually been presented in an oversimplified or half-hearted manner, as a means of getting kids away from the main worship space while the adults (supposedly more switched on to moral teaching) listen to the preacher drone on. This gives us the next problem with living by the book: the book itself is not always MADE TO LIVE, either from the pulpit or in the actions of the church. Priests don't always 'get' life, especially if they're celibate, or in the Anglican context, happily married for some time. They don't always 'get' life if they've got more letters after their name than the alphabet; their life has been in books and seminaries. Many priests are in no position to denounce sin because they have never met sin head-on. The way to live life by the book is to explore the society that has inspired the book; the same society that the book is perpetually applicable to, in spite of constant secular resistance. We have then this circular dilemma of people failing at life because they don't know the book (and therefore Jesus), and they don't read the book because their upbringing has not inspired them to do so. As Christians in the here and now, we occupy this strange liminal space of knowing snatches of scripture, trying to live the gospel, but never really understanding it enough to teach it. But teach it we must, and we can really only teach it by experience and interpersonal immersion (not just communication); immersion in the kind of position Christ was in: he was IN the world, but not OF the world. As mere mortals, it is a fine tightrope to walk. Real life is no fairy tale, but then neither is the Bible. The two do not chase each other, but inspire each other, provided we have the patience to understand the respective wisdom of the God that links them. To live 'by the book' is integrate the Bible with the book of life.
