Twenty-Fourth Sunday After Pentecost



Sentence

Watch and be ready, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. *(Matthew 24:42, 44)*

The Collect

Eternal God, you have taught us that the night is far spent and the day is at hand: keep us awake and alert, watching for your kingdom, so that when Christ the bridegroom comes, we may go out joyfully to meet him, and with him enter into the marriage feast that you have prepared for all who truly love you; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of Joshua, chapter 24, beginning at verse 14. 'Now therefore revere the Lord, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the Lord. Now if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord.' Then the people answered, 'Far be it from us that we should forsake the Lord to serve other gods; for it is the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Eqypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. He protected us along all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed; and the Lord drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the Lord, for he is our God.' But Joshua said to the people, 'You cannot serve the Lord, for he is a holy God. He is a jealous God; he will not forgive your transgressions or your sins. If you forsake the Lord and serve foreign gods, then he will turn and do you harm, and consume you, after having done you good.' And the people said to Joshua, 'No, we will serve the Lord!' Then Joshua said to the people, 'You are witnesses against yourselves that you have chosen the Lord, to serve him.' And they said, 'We are witnesses.' He said, 'Then put away the foreign gods that are among you, and incline your hearts to the Lord, the God of Israel.'

The people said to Joshua, 'The Lord our God we will serve, and him we will obey.' So Joshua made a covenant with the people that day, and made statutes and ordinances for them at Shechem.

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 78, verses 1 to 7 **R: Tell each new generation of the glory of the Lord**

Give ear, O my people, to my teaching; incline your ears to the words of my mouth. I will open my mouth in a parable; I will utter dark sayings from of old, things that we have heard and known, that our ancestors have told us. **R**...

We will not hide them from their children; we will tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord, and his might, and the wonders that he has done. **R**...

He established a decree in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which he commanded our ancestors to teach to their children; **R**...

that the next generation might know them, the children yet unborn, and rise up and tell them to their children, so that they should set their hope in God, and not forget the works of God, but keep his commandments. **R...**

Second Reading

A reading from the First Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians, chapter 4, beginning at verse 9.

Now concerning love of the brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anyone write to you, for you yourselves have been taught by God to love one another; and indeed you do love all the brothers and sisters throughout Macedonia. But we urge you, beloved, to do so more and more, to aspire to live quietly, to mind your own affairs, and to work with your hands, as we directed you, so that you may behave properly towards outsiders and be dependent on no one. But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers and sisters, about those who have died, so that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have died.

For this we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died.

For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together

with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord for ever. Therefore encourage one another with these words. *Hear the word of the Lord.* **Thanks be to God.**

The Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia! Alleluia!

Look, for the bridegroom is coming and is now here; let us go out to meet him. **Alleluia!**

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew, chapter 25, beginning at the first verse.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

'Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, "Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him." Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, "Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out." But the wise replied, "No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves." And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, "Lord, lord, open to us." But he replied, "Truly I tell you, I do not know you." Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.

Thoughts for the Week

Let's face it some people are happy enough without God. Some people are happy enough without religion trying to tell them how to live their life all the time. There is comfort in ignorance; that is, not educating oneself in the machinations of the church, the lives of the saints, the patterns of Christian prayer and festivals. Outside of the big commercial ones, of course. The Christmas and Easter people. Yet without the context we learn through the rest of the year, such festivals are effectively meaningless to those who close themselves off from even the most rudimentary attempts at belief. Commercial festivals are about spending, indulgence, and of course, the time-honoured tradition of family. Yes, families tend to be happier without God. Right? Well, I beg to differ. Families without God, i.e. those in whom Christian belief is not shared by at least both parents, are more likely to fall apart at the seams when the going gets tough. Because there is no moral fortitude, no spiritual

groundwork to act as foundation for the family's values. Relationships, whether or not they deign to consider the subject of marriage (in the eves of God), become all about financial stability, emotional security, physical intimacy, and teaching prosperity and shrewdness to children rather than integrity and compassion. Human pillars are flesh and blood: they will crumple and break under the weight of hardship. People may seem content without God, until they run out of people to turn to. Relationships dissolve, trust is broken, money burns, physical pleasures only scratch a very momentary itch. What is the foundation from which springs recovery? This has to be of a spiritual nature. This has to be a sense of strength coming from an intangible, indefatigable other. God is not only strength, he is direction and focus for one's life. He expands our possibilities by making us think outside the box of what might be materially or financially possible. He gives us the sanctuary of personal relationship with Jesus Christ, and the ability to share the nature of that relationship with others, so that they might come to know the one who will never abandon them. But if we must measure success by 'happy families', the family will only truly be content if both parents know how to pray and teach the scriptures to their children. United, the house will stand; divided, it will undoubtedly fall.
