Twenty-Second Sunday After Pentecost



<u>Sentence</u>

Let those that seek the Lord be joyful in heart; seek the Lord and his strength; O seek his face continually. (*Psalm 105:3-4*)

The Collect

O God, whose Son has taught us that love is the fulfillment of your law: stir up within us the fire of your Holy Spirit, and pour into our hearts your greatest gift of love, so that we may love you with our whole being, and our neighbours as ourselves; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. **Amen.**

First Reading

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy, chapter 34, beginning at verse 1. Then Moses went up from the plains of Moab to Mount Nebo, to the top of Pisgah, which is opposite Jericho, and the Lord showed him the whole land: Gilead as far as Dan, all Naphtali, the land of Ephraim and Manasseh, all the land of Judah as far as the Western Sea, the Negeb, and the Plain-that is, the valley of Jericho, the city of palm trees—as far as Zoar. The Lord said to him, 'This is the land of which I swore to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, saying, "I will give it to your descendants"; I have let you see it with your eyes, but you shall not cross over there.' Then Moses, the servant of the Lord, died there in the land of Moab, at the Lord's command. He was buried in a valley in the land of Moab, opposite Bethpeor, but no one knows his burial place to this day. Moses was one hundred and twenty years old when he died; his sight was unimpaired and his vigour had not abated. The Israelites wept for Moses in the plains of Moab for thirty days; then the period of mourning for Moses was ended. Joshua son of Nun was full of the spirit of wisdom, because Moses had laid his hands on him; and the Israelites obeyed him, doing as the Lord had commanded Moses. Never since has there arisen a prophet in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face. He was unequalled for all the signs and wonders that the Lord sent him to perform in the land of Egypt, against Pharaoh and all his servants and his entire land, and for all the mighty deeds and all the terrifying displays of power that Moses performed in the sight of all Israel.

Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Psalm 90, verses 13 to 17 **R: Lord, forever you have been our dwelling place.**

Second Reading

A reading from Paul's First Letter to the Thessalonians, chapter 2, beginning at the first verse.

You yourselves know, brothers and sisters, that our coming to you was not in vain, but though we had already suffered and been shamefully maltreated at Philippi, as you know, we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in spite of great opposition. For our appeal does not spring from deceit or impure motives or trickery, but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the message of the gospel, even so we speak, not to please mortals, but to please God who tests our hearts. As you know and as God is our witness, we never came with words of flattery or with a pretext for greed; nor did we seek praise from mortals, whether from you or from others, though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. But we were gentle among you, like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children. So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us. You remember our labour and toil, brothers and sisters; we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you while we proclaimed to you the gospel of God. You are witnesses, and God also, how pure, upright, and blameless our conduct was towards you believers. As you know, we dealt with each one of you like a father with his children, urging and encouraging you and pleading that you should lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory. We also constantly give thanks to God for this, that when you received the word of God that you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word but as what it really is, God's word, which is also at work in you believers. Hear the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Whoever loves me will keep my word, says the Lord, and my Father will love him and we will come to him.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Matthew, chapter 22, beginning at the thirty-fourth verse.

Glory to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

When the Pharisees heard that he had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. 'Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?' He said to him, ' "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind." This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbour as yourself." On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets.' Now while the Pharisees were gathered together, Jesus asked them this question: 'What do you think of the Messiah? Whose son is he?' They said to him, 'The son of David.' He said to them, 'How is it then that David by the Spirit calls him Lord, saying, "The Lord said to my Lord, 'Sit at my right hand, until I put your enemies under your feet' "? If David thus calls him Lord, how can he be his son?' No one was able to give him an answer, nor from that day did anyone dare to ask him any more questions.

Abide with your church as it struggles to find its way back to the gospel truth. Lord, in your mercy: **Hear our prayer.**

Thoughts for the Week

The health of the body, and the health of the mind, are inextricably linked to the health of the spirit. We don't tend to realise the difference it can make to the healing process to have a healthy spirit, or spiritual life. This means a healthy outlook on identity, purpose, motivation, routine, family and relationships. It's all too easy to say or think that 'God will fix everything', or to slap on a Jesus-shaped band-aid. Saying Jesus over and over, or parroting scripture that one clearly hasn't bothered to understand, do not a healthy spirit make. I know that sounds contrary, but the reality is that Jesus is so much more than a name, just as we are so much more than a name, or dare I say, a number on a spreadsheet.

There are a frightening number of Christians out there who only care about THEIR Christianity. THEIR Lord. THEIR story. Remember this: your testimony is only a testimony if it is *edifying to another*, rather than just talking about yourself. If you want to help someone: inspire someone. Don't just say how good you've got it. Don't just rattle off the writings of Paul and call it the gospel. Ironically, that is not actually healthy. It's not a healthy spirit, and it's not healthy Christianity. Because it does not make a watchword of *empathy*. It does not seek to listen, nor to understand, nor to *abide* with the lost; it merely passes judgment on them. These are real people, with real lives, and real lives come with real sin, real temptation, real pull toward evil. And it's a battle. It's a battle that scars as much as bullets and bayonets. That's what I mean about the link between body, mind and spirit. A troubled spirit can result from a troubled mind, for instance, or a body will be burdened by spiritual burdens. To heal one's wounds is to get to know the enemy that caused them. To understand the face and nature of vice, as well as the effect it has on people's lives. Scripture can only be the medicine if a) the diagnosis is thorough, and b) if it is administered with the care of a spiritual surgeon, rather than a snake-oil salesman. To heal a person, one must understand, and must persevere with that person.
